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## **\$750,000 Grant Will Reduce HIV Among Portland's High-Risk Youth**

**Cascade AIDS Project, Outside In, and Multnomah County's African American AIDS Awareness Action Alliance collaborate to use new media for HIV prevention education**

PORTLAND, OR (November 2, 2009) – A joint effort between **Cascade AIDS Project (CAP)**, **Outside In** and the **African American AIDS Awareness Action Alliance (A6)** was awarded \$750,000 over three years to bring HIV prevention and education to Portland's at-risk youth. The grant, one of ten awarded nationally by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Minority Health, will fund **Curbing HIV/AIDS Transmission Among High Risk Minority Youth and Adolescents (CHAT-PDX)**, a program fusing peer education with new media to engage Portland's at-risk, minority youth.

Almost a third of Oregonians with HIV/AIDS contracted HIV when they were under the age of 30. Among youth, minorities, those living in foster homes, disadvantaged neighborhoods, the corrections system, or on the streets are at the highest risk of contracting HIV. Yet they are also the least likely to benefit from sexuality education in school.

“Basically, we’re creating a youth movement to stop the spread of HIV using the methods youth are experts in. Youth culture, social networking, story telling, internet outreach and communication—young people use these everyday to connect. CHAT-PDX will give high-risk youth the information, encouragement, and tools they need to share HIV prevention information the ways they know best,” says Michael Anderson-Nathe, Cascade AIDS Project’s Director of Prevention and Education.

Zarod Rominski, Outside In’s Associate Executive Director says, “Homeless youth are highly vulnerable to all sorts of diseases, including HIV. The CHAT-PDX program will allow Outside In to engage youth in Guerilla Theater – a dynamic peer education program whereby youth reach out to their social circle with information on how to prevent HIV.”

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**About Cascade AIDS Project (CAP)**

Cascade AIDS Project is the oldest and largest community-based provider of HIV services, including housing, education, and advocacy in Oregon and Southwest Washington. CAP's mission is to lead efforts to prevent new HIV infections, care for people affected and infected by HIV/AIDS, educate communities to eliminate stigma and shame, and advocate for immediate action in combating the pandemic. Overall, last year CAP provided HIV/AIDS education and prevention services to 16,040 people and coordinated wrap-around support services for 2,502 people affected and infected with HIV/AIDS. In addition, 735 people gave 19,960 hours of their time to help CAP achieve its mission.
